Fire transforming us for the good

For many people, relaxing by a campfire is a favorite summer activity. Nestling into the surrounding darkness while gazing into dancing flames, we sense God's love and let the day's chaos go. In contrast, Exodus 24:17 describes, "Now the appearance of the glory of God was like a devouring fire."

Pastor Steve Garnaas-Holmes offers another take, writing about God using flames to change us. (The full poem is here: unfoldinglight.net/2025/02/24/fire) God, your presence is like a consuming fire —

not destructive, but transformative, not the fire of anger but the flame of love,

the fire of glassblowers and bakers the grace to make us more beautiful, strong and useful.

Your glory is no tame campfire where we sit and make s'mores. It burns out of our control.

The furnace of your love

roars about our hearts, remaking us Teach us to be unafraid. ...

When you bask in firelight glow — and maybe eat some s'mores! — ponder how God is transforming you with love, and for the sake of love.

Complete joy

Because Jesus came to do such serious work, we often imagine him straightfaced. Yet Jesus also enjoyed fun times, such as the wedding celebration at Cana. When the wine ran out, Jesus miraculously produced more.

Jesus also warmly welcomed children. Picture him lifting an infant into the air or tickling a giggling youngster while another child, grinning, climbs on his back.

Summer usually allows more time for fun and play. So use these months to teach the kids in your life — and to remind yourself — that Jesus came so our "joy may be complete" (John 15:11). Laughing, playing, having fun, relaxing and enjoying life are part of living and loving as faithful disciples.

PELICAN — In the Middle Ages, the pelican came to represent Jesus' sacrifice of his blood for the world. According to legend, a mother pelican, in times of famine, would pluck open her chest and feed her young with her own blood. An alternate myth was that she fed her dying young with her blood to revive them, losing her own life in the process. The depiction of a pelican with a drop of blood on her chest is called "the pelican in her piety."


NEW BIBLE STUDY BEGINS

On Wednesday, July 9, from 11:00-12:00, and for six Wednesdays, Rev. Bev will begin a new series called "Drop-In Bible Study." The topic will be the Revised Common Lectionary. That is, the four readings each Sunday used by 19 Protestant denominations in the U.S. plus 34 others worldwide. The UCC preachers at Mayflower typically use two of the four. We'll discover at how the Common Lectionary came to be, then participants will read together the four Scripture passages prescribed for the following Sunday and discuss what jumps out---to you---as preachable (a key idea). There may or may not be a thread that holds them all together. Dr. Wolf is preaching the Ten Commandments in July, but he will also use one of the Lectionary readings. NO NEED TO PREREGISTER. Bring your Bible, and DROP IN! July 9,16,23,30 and August 6 and 13.

Tips for gardeners

"Love is to the heart what the summer is to the farmer's year," said evangelist Billy Graham. "It brings to harvest all the loveliest flowers of the soul." Without summer, our gardens would disappoint, and without love, our hearts wouldn't bloom.

The warmth of summer and love aren't the only ingredients required for abundant physical and spiritual crops, however. Discernment and persistence ensure fruitful yields in both areas. "Unless we know the difference between flowers and weeds, we are not fit to take care of a garden," advised Clyde Francis Lytle. "It is not enough to have truth planted in our minds. We must learn and labor to keep the ground clear of thorns and briars, follies and perversities, which have a wicked propensity to choke the word of life."



Perspectives on patriotism



While pondering differences between patriotism and nationalism, Ryan Hamm looks to Jesus' example in Luke 19:41-44. "Jesus, it seems, loved his people, his city, his nation — so much so that he cried over it," he writes in Christianity Today. "He didn't despise his country or wish ill upon it — instead, he wanted nothing but the best for it, and it grieved him to see how his people had rejected his teachings."

This example of "patriotism perfected" can serve as a guide for modern-day Christians, according to Hamm. "It's an example that's both pragmatic and romantic, shot through with justice, truth and love. It's not a nationalistic patriotism — it's a love for nation that doesn't pit it against other nations. Instead, it's a recognition of love followed by a mournful recognition of shortcomings."

Put another way, God doesn't love America more than any other nation. And he doesn't want us to worship our nation alongside him, because that is idolatry. Instead, we are to love and proclaim God above any earthly realm.

Holy ground

For me, there's nothing guite like taking off my sandals in the summer and walking through the grass. But when our sons were infants, neither shared that love of going barefoot. When we'd attempt to lower them to play outside, they'd raise their legs, trying not to touch the tickly, prickly, green ground. "Do not come any closer," the Lord warned Moses through the burning bush. "Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy ground" (Exodus 3:5, NIV). In God's presence, Moses faced a turning point: either resist God's instructions or obey, leading the Israelites out of Egypt. Maybe taking off my sandals this summer can remind me that I'm standing in God's presence. I may not hear a booming voice, and I might just be standing at the kitchen sink doing chores. Or I might be at a barbecue, with the opportunity to truly listen to my neighbors. God's presence permeates life's big moments as well as the mundane.

How can you "take off your sandals" and enter what God has for you?

The gift of the Bible

Certain parts of the Bible are hard to understand — and even harder to explain to children. But the late Rachel Held Evans made a start, and then coauthor Matthew Paul Turner completed What Is the Bible? This picture book can help adults as well as kids receive the gift of Scripture. The Bible is often described as a library of books. Held and Turner explain that it's also many different kinds of writing: stories, poems, wise sayings, songs, letters. Scripture tells of Creation, good and evil rulers, miraculous events, animals that spoke or brought food to hungry people, even monsters! The best part, the authors write, is that "in the Bible we meet Jesus, who teaches us new things about God, faith, and ourselves" - above all, that God loves us. "And if a story in [Scripture] is confusing or scary or sad, we can imagine how Jesus, who loves us, might tell us that story."

Bible scholars call this "the canon within the canon." As Christians, we read all other parts of Scripture through the lens of the Gospels, where we meet God *in person*, as Jesus. Similarly, 500 years ago Martin Luther called the Bible "the cradle that holds the Christ." That's a word-picture even children can grasp!

Prayer Team

What is the Prayer Team?

The Prayer Team is a group of Mayflower members and friends who meet on the 2nd and 4th Friday of each month at 10:00 am in the conference room to pray for individuals and concerns on the prayer list. Meetings last about 45 minutes. Prayer Team members can participate as much or little as they like, and they do NOT have to pray "out loud" unless they want to! Everyone in the congregation is welcome-and encouraged-to join. If unable to attend meetings, the prayer list will be shared by email, and members are asked to pray as often as possible.

Who/what is on the prayer list, and how is it disseminated?

The Prayer Team prays for individuals in the congregation who request prayer whether it is for themselves, family members, friends, or other special needs—and for Mayflower Church and its missions, statewide, national, worldwide issues, and many other concerns. The prayer list is updated as requests are received and emailed to the Prayer Team and anyone else in the congregation upon request.

How to be added to the prayer list

Prayer requests can be made by (1) calling or emailing Shirley Smith or the church office; (2) completing a prayer request form located in the friendship pads, and placing it in the prayer request box at the back of the Sanctuary; or (3) submitting a request on the Mayflower website.

Confidentiality

Individuals who request prayer are assured confidentiality. Whatever information is given to the church office or Shirley Smith or written on the prayer request form will not be shared with anyone or disclosed on the prayer list without the requester's permission. The prayer list itself is NOT confidential—it is passed on by email and can be shared with many people. When requesting prayer-whether for yourself or someone else-it is sufficient to say "health issue", "healing", "personal", or no reason at all. We should rest assured that God knows the details of every concern.

Thank you for your continued support to the Grace Place Food Pantry. For the 2024/2025 academic year Grace Place welcomed more than 1,300 students to their campus and provided food to weekly 350 food pantry families in

Golden Gate. They are deeply grateful for our Mayflower weekly food donations and our volunteers helping at the Friday Food Pantry.

The Mayflower Mission team also received a letter from Grace Place updating us about key changes that are affecting their programs.

Copies of the letter are available in the Narthex on the table near the bulletin boards.

To summarize the highlights, we are sharing a condensed version of important concerns:

Dear Grace Place Community, Partners, and Supporters,

As we move through 2025, I want to update you on key changes that may impact Grace Place programs and the families we see. We are navigating a rapidly shifting landscape - one that affects not just policy, but people. Many recent federal actions and proposals touch the lives of our students, parents, and staff in deeply personal ways. These changes create uncertainty, pulling our team's focus from programs to planning for an unpredictable future. Our areas of concern include:

• Federal Food Assistance Cuts

Proposed reductions to programs like SNAP, TEFAP, WIC, EFSP and school meal programs could significantly affect our families' access to food, Cuts may also impact our pantry operations- even though we don't receive direct federal food funding, our supporting partners do, and they are projecting supply reductions of 8-37% over the next two years.

- Immigration- Related Policy Shifts Rollbacks on visa protections, changes to asylum, student, family reunification, and deportation policies could impact Grace Place families, adding fear and uncertainty to their daily life.
- Freeze on Discretionary Federal Grants Grants, like the 21st Century Cmmunity Learning Centr (CCLC), which funds our after-school and summer programs, face delays or reductions.

A modern Noah and his ark

A commercial mariner in the Gulf of Mexico makes it his business to save animals from drowning — not just two by two, but hundreds over recent years. In 2018 Brandon Upton first saw shadows floating near his boat. Realizing they were sea turtles, he contacted animal-protection authorities. The creatures were "cold-stunned" because the water had dropped below 56°F. Sea turtles become comatose in such conditions, putting them at risk of drowning, boat strike or, if washed ashore, land predators.

Every winter since, Upton pulls an airboat alongside his main vessel, rescuing any stunned turtles he sees. He brings them to San Padre Island National Seashore workers, who gradually warm them in a rehabilitation center. Then they release the turtles back into the wild.

As Christians, we often focus on helping people in need. But God created and cares about animals too. Perhaps you share love with a pet or donate to protect endangered species. Maybe you've taken kids to a zoo to learn the wonders of animal life. Perhaps you take pains to carry a spider outside or, like Upton, own special equipment to help animals. We can care for God's creatures in countless ways — no need to build an ark!

Preventing blind spots

About 40% of any vehicle consists of blind spots, which are responsible for an estimated 800,000 accidents each year in the United States. People also have blind spots, and when they're spiritual, they can have tragic consequences.

Pastor Rick Warren suggests these steps for discovering and overcoming blind spots:

Pray, asking God to remind you what is true about him — and about you. "Point out anything in me that offends you, and lead me along the path of everlasting life" (Psalm 139:24, NLT). Ask some trusted Christian friends or family to point out things in you that you can't see. "Fools think their own way is right, but the wise listen to others" (Proverbs 12:15, NLT).

Finally, ask Jesus to change you. The Bible says the truth will set you free (John 8:32), and Jesus calls himself the truth (John 14:6). So the closer you are to Jesus, the more he will fill you with the truth. As God's truth helps you see clearly, you'll be less vulnerable to self decepti
