Beautiful feet

"How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" (Romans 10:15, NIV). Such beauty has nothing to do with the feet being clean, newly pedicured, elegantly clad. They may be the dusty feet of aid workers bringing food to drought-stricken areas, or the muddy shoes of those rushing disaster relief to flood zones. They may be the swollen feet of a dedicated nurse after a 12-hour hospital shift, or the tired feet of a parent pacing with a baby at 3 a.m.

In the upper room before Jesus' arrest, he declared his disciples' dirty feet beautiful by touching and washing them lovingly, preparing them to go out yet again with his good news for all. And on the cross, Jesus' own feet — nail-pierced — were beautiful.

After Pope Francis died on Easter Monday 2025, many mourners who paid their respects noticed his shoes. Instead of new, well-polished "dress shoes," the scuffed items clearly had walked countless steps. They were the sturdy boots of a worker, a pilgrim, a travel companion on the road of life, the journey of faith. They were the shoes — the feet — of a disciple of Christ willing to go wherever needed to bring the good news of God's love. How beautiful!

No reserve, retreat or regrets

William Borden (1887-1913) was a Yale grad and the heir to his family's fortune. But he left behind a life of riches and comfort to become a Christian missionary. Before arriving in China, where he had hoped to share the gospel with the Kansu people, Borden died of spinal meningitis at just 25 years old. According to legend, the words "No Reserve," "No Retreat" and "No Regrets" were later found in Borden's Bible.

Unlike the men who told Jesus they had to handle some family business before following him (see Luke 9:57-62), Borden didn't waver or stall. Some people might say Borden "didn't make a good trade," writes Kyle Idleman in his book *Not a Fan*. Borden "gave up his family, his fortune and a future career to follow Jesus," Idleman writes, "and he died before he reached the mission field. But this man ... knew he had made the right decision."

By committing completely to Christ, Borden inspired other mission workers and pastors, including Idleman. "Say no to self and yes to Jesus every time," Borden wrote in his journal. More than a century after his death, that no-regrets message lives on.

Fixer-uppers



Summer is peak time for home renovations and remodeling projects. Those can be super stressful, starting with the selection of a contractor.

In a blog about her own family's construction plans, Laura Elliott explains the challenge: "It's not just any builder I want. I want one who has impeccable workmanship, is completely trustworthy and delivers our long-awaited [projects] early and under-budget." After sifting through bids and reviews, she discovered that most builders "look like they do pretty similar work for a pretty similar price."

For spiritual renovations, however, the choice is clear. "God is the builder of everything," says Hebrews 3:4 (NIV).

Elliott writes, "Jesus is not only the *builder* of His Father's house, but He is the *buyer*, and the *heir* as well." And what he's building, she adds, is "a better Bride," his church.

Faith upgrades are an ongoing, lifelong process. "The renewal of our natures is a work of great importance," said 18th-century minister George Whitefield. "It is not to be done in a day. We have not only a new house to build up, but an old one to pull down." It's a good thing God oversees this project!

Why Christian community is key

Christian symbol



ALTAR — This central furnishing in a Christian worship space is usually large, with a solid front that may be decorated with symbols or words. The flat surface, often covered with a cloth, is where the Communion elements are prepared and placed, reminding us of Jesus' sacrifice as the Lamb of God. In some churches, the altar looks more like a table, with open legwork. We remember that Jesus invites us into fellowship with God noand to the heavenly banquet for eternity. We place offerings on the altar to symbolize our sacrificial response to God's redeeming love.

Captivity transformed

In Jesus' first sermon in Nazareth, he read from Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me ... to bring good news to the poor ... to proclaim release to the captives" (Luke 4:18, NRSV). Then he declared this Scripture fulfilled — in him. Ever since, in countless ways, Jesus has transformed captivity and dead ends into freedom and new beginnings.

A modern instance is a lovely new apartment complex built out of Lorton (Virginia) Reformatory, a prison that operated from 1910 to 2001. The beautifully renovated apartments — fittingly named Liberty Crest — opened in 2017. This project demonstrates wise stewardship by channeling new life into an old space, and care for people in need by reserving more than 25% of the units for low-income renters. Whether this project's developers are disciples of Jesus or not, the divine power of resurrection has been at work through them.

We're all held captive by something: illness, debt, oppression, violence, our own sin or another sort of dead end. But Jesus brings liberty where only prison was known. He transforms death into life, despair into hope, endings into bright new beginnings. May we who follow him do the same.

Lectionary Bible Study

What are we learning in our drop-in series, Lectionary Bible Study? The main thing has been discovering what the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) is. It's the Bible readings (lections) on any given Sunday that are being used by 39 protestant denominations in every part of the world. If you went to church

at the Indonesian Chistian Church or Anglican Church of Australia next Sunday, their scripture readings would be the same as ours. The idea behind the RCL is that over three years (Years A, B, and C) most of the Bible will have been read. We are in Year C right now.

There's one exception to this pattern of readings, and that's if the preacher decides to do a sermon series on one subject, as Dr. Wolf has been doing this summer on the Ten Commandments. In a case like that, the preacher chooses scripture that fits with her or his theme. (It's been a wonderful series, and we're not happy to see his time with us come to an end.)

Our class has been reading aloud the scripture selections for the upcoming Sunday. Then we discuss where there might be a theme or a common idea amongst them. Since there are four readings (though our pastors generally use two) we read an Old Testament (Hebrew Scriptures), a Psalm, an Epistle, and the Gospel for the day.

Starting on Sunday, August 3, Rev. Rick New will, indeed, select from the lectionary as the basis for his sermons. We are excited to welcome him back, and the class will be listening intently to see if the lectionary scripture passages that WE studied inspired him in at all the same way! (The drop-in Bible Study class will meet July 30 and August 6 and 13---as of the moment.)

Personal Preparedness

When disasters strike, it is important that you have all the necessary information easily accessible to ensure a smooth recovery process. We encourage you to use this envelope to store essential documents that will ease your recovery process. Be sure to store it in an area that is easily accessible in the event of an emergency and potential evacuation

Household Identification

- Vital records: birth certificate, marriage license, divorce decree, adoption paperwork, custody paperwork
- Hentification: passport, driver's license, social security card, green card, military identification, naturalization documents, other
- Pet information: ID Tag information, vaccination records, microchip identification, emotional support/service animal documentation, prescriptions

Financial and Legal Documentation

- Housing: lease or rental agreement, mortgage, home equity line of credit, deed
- Vehicle: loan documents, VIN, registration, title
- Financial Obligations: utility bills, credit cards, student loans, alimony, child support, elder care, automatic payments such as gym memberships
- Insurance Policies: homeowners, renters, auto, life, flood, appraisals, pet, photos, and list of valuable items

- Sources of Income: pay stubs, government benefits, alimony, child support
- → Tax Statements: federal/state income tax returns, property tax, vehicle tax
- Bank account information: retirement, investment, savings, checking
 → Estate Planning: will, trust, power of attorney

Medical Information

- Health/dental insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, VA Health Benefits
- List of medications, immunizations, allergies, prescriptions, medical equipment and devices, pharmacy information (including glasses/contacts)
- → Living will, medical power of attorney
- Caregiver agency contract or service agreement
- → Disabilities documentation
- Contact information for doctor/specialists, dentists, pediatricians, veterinarians
 Emergency Contact Information
- → Family/friends
- Employers/supervisors, schools, houses of worship, social service providers > Homeowners
 Associations

**Keep some cash in your emergency kit to pay for emergency purchases in the event that ATMs are not functioning or banks are closed. The amount of cash should be based on the basic needs of your family, including food, gas, and other things you use on a day-to-day basis.
